GRADING FOR LEARNING- RETAKES AND REDOS

We're about a month into the school year, and students and teachers are in the process of assessing the learning that has taken place so far. Our overarching focus is to give students the opportunity to practice applying knowledge and skills. Teachers give feedback and more practice until they are ready to show what they have learned on a summative assessment.

The practice and feedback have little or no weight on grades, as kids need the opportunity to practice what they have learned without being penalized. When it is time for a summative assessment (examples could be a unit test, project, paper, etc... something that demonstrates learning and the application of that learning), this is what grades are primarily based upon.

Summative assessments are tied to our academic standards for each content area, as well as specific learning targets in each lesson. Students have multiple opportunities to demonstrate proficiency in each standard throughout the year.

Students have the opportunity to retake or redo these summative assessments under specific conditions. Students can do this by first asking the teacher for a "Request to Retake" form. This form requires students to reflect on the reasons for the grade earned on the first assessment and make a plan of action to prepare for the retake. Once students have provided the teacher with evidence that they have prepared for a retake assessment, they are allowed to do it. They can earn full credit on retakes and redos.

A criticism of this approach is that it doesn't teach responsibility. I would argue the opposite is true...

- Our goal is that students learn. It doesn't matter on what day or how many times it takes to demonstrate it.
- Students who prepare and do well on an assessment the first time can continue and extend learning.
- The student who was not prepared or struggled on the first assessment is required to do more preparation to show that they are ready and will spend more of their own time preparing for the retake.

If a student earns a higher grade under these conditions, they have learned far more responsibility than simply receiving a poor grade or a zero.

We also provide students and parents with feedback about work habit behaviors through The Raider Way (See pg3). This reported separately from academic learning.

PLEASE CHECK SKYWARD FAMILY ACCESS FOR GRADES... AND BEHAVIOR

We take time to honor students who are responsible with their academics and in their behavior. Today we had our 1st Raider Way Celebration! All students had the opportunity to get their face painted, snap a selfie with Ricky Raider, and compete in Speed Dodge Ball. Future celebrations will be for those students who are exhibiting

HERE IS THE REALLY IMPORTANT PART:



THE RAIDER WAY

The Raider Way is a second set of standards, based on what we call our behavior or employability standards. These standards assess students on skills needed to be successful in school and the workplace.

The grades students earn by demonstrating competency in each standard are as follows:

- Exceeds Expectations (EE)
- Meets Expectations (ME)
- Approaching Expectations (AE)
- Does Not Meet Expectations (DE)

Above, you will find the rubric used to determine the competency of each student, for each standard. It is very simple and straightforward. In this format, we can provide students and parents with much more detailed information.

This is part of our ongoing work to measure academic and behavioral progress separately. Academic grades are a measure of what students know and can do, while behavior/employability grades are a measure of the vocational and social skills necessary to be successful in school, the workplace and society. These standards help students develop the vocational and social skills necessary to come prepared to the workplace, work as part of a team, persevere through difficult problem solving situations, use appropriate social skills, and more.

Moving forward, your child's Raider Way grades will be updated on designated days throughout the quarter. Advisors will update these grades on the 3rd, 6th, and final Fridays of the quarter.

You may see these grades in Skyward Family Access throughout the quarter, just like other grades. This way, you are able to see any decline or improvement in their performance before the end of the quarter.
